


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President's Message

GENERAL REGULATIONS 2025

GROUND REGULATIONS

The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society blameless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such an accident or loss of any exhibit.

The Committee reserves the right to alter the rules of, or cancel any event if in their opinion circumstances justify such decision.

The use of communications devices by competitors during competition is strictly prohibited. The Committee reserves the right to call upon any competitor subject to age limit, at any time to furnish at his/her expense, Birth Certificate or copy thereof, or other proof, and may at its discretion withhold any prize money until such certificate, copy or proof shall have been furnished. The age of the competitor shall be taken as the age on the day of appearance in the Show.

Every animal on the ground, shall, when not in harness be secured by a headstall. The penalty for infringement of this regulation shall be at the discretion of the Committee, and may, in the case of an exhibit, lead to disqualification, and in other cases to summary removal from the ground.

The lessee's of stud horses for the season will be regarded as the owners for the purpose of exhibiting, providing such exhibitor produces written lease if required by the Secretary, but this will not apply to hunters and trotters.

No gambling in any shape or form will be tolerated on the ground.

EXHIBITORS INFORMATION

All entries must have an entry ticket attached with the Class & Section written. Name written clearly on the reverse.

Strictly no entries unless accompanied by fees. Members, partners and children under 16yrs shall be entitled to enter exhibits free of charge in the main pavilion.

Strictly no late entries. Please note the dates and times for entries and exhibits on page 5

All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.

No exhibitor shall remove his or her exhibit from the ground before 4.30pm on the day of the Show without the consent of the Stewards concerned.

All exhibitors and other persons not associated with the judging must vacate the pavilion by 10.30am on Friday 19th September.

A protest may be lodged by an exhibitor regarding the bona fides of any exhibit but it must be in writing, in the hands of the Secretary no later than 6.00pm on the day of the Show, accompanied by the sum of \$5 which will be forfeited to the Committee if the protest is deemed frivolous.



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STEWARDS INFORMATION

Stewards are particularly requested to make themselves acquainted with their duties as outlined below, the general regulations and those concerning the Judges.

In all classes:

- Two Stewards shall accompany each Judge (to be appointed by the Committee).
- Draw the attention of Judges to the conditions governing each class.
- Stewards shall attend at the time appointed and shall attend to the reception, classification and placing of all exhibits and to the matters therewith.
- Stewards shall take judging summaries from the Judges when filled in and signed, and deliver to the Secretary who will give them prize cards. The winners name shall be written thereon by the Chief Steward, which the Stewards will then affix to the winning exhibit.
- Wait upon the Judges and afford them all necessary information.
- Arrange amongst themselves for the constant and effective supervision of their classes.
- Countersign the Judges award cards, obtain prize cards from the Secretary and affix to prize exhibits.
- Not say or do anything to influence the Judges decision.
- See that all sections in their respective classes are judged.
- Not reveal the name of the exhibitor or repeat any remarks the Judges make.
- Should a Judge think it advisable to reject any exhibit, or are in doubt on any matter, report same to the Secretary.
- Remove all exhibitors and other persons from the vicinity of the Judges whilst judging.
- Pavilion Stewards are requested to attend at the closing of the Show to deliver exhibits to exhibitors or authorised receivers.

JUDGES INFORMATION

Upon arrival at the Showground, the Judges are invited to attend the Secretary's Office, where they will be met by the Stewards, who will supply them with the necessary information in regard to the classes they have been appointed to judge.

Judging for Pavilion Exhibits will commence at 11am sharp on Friday 19th September.

Judges may withhold a prize where an exhibit is not up to Show form.

Decisions of Judges to be final except as regards the bona fides of exhibits or exhibitors.

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DEMOLITION DERBY RULES & REGULATIONS

COMPETITION REGULATIONS FOR COMPETITORS NSW Demolition Derby Rules and Regulations



1. Introduction

Rules and Regulations for the Conduct of Competitions at New South Wales Agricultural Shows & Affiliated Agricultural Shows

The rules and regulations set out below are the minimum required rules to be included in organiser rules to conduct a Demolition Derby at an Agricultural Show in NSW under the AgShows NSW Insurance programme. Any additional rules must follow relevant legislation and regulations (e.g., WHS or Safework). This is necessary to improve the safety of participants and other stakeholders and encourage education, competition, and skill development.

Demolition Derbies are designed to ensure a safe and enjoyable competition for participants while delivering thrilling entertainment for spectators.

2. Definitions

Competitor: A registered participant driving a vehicle in the Demolition Derby. Must meet age and licensing requirements, attend scrutineering and the Toolbox Talk, and comply with all vehicle and conduct rules.

Judge: The Judge is responsible for monitoring the Demolition Derby event to determine competition outcomes in accordance with the rules. This includes identifying the last mobile vehicle, ensuring fair conduct, and confirming the winner(s). The Judge's role is strictly observational and decision-based. All decisions made by the Judge regarding the outcome of the event are final and cannot be disputed.

Scrutineer: The Scrutineer is responsible for inspecting all vehicles and ensuring they meet the safety and compliance standards outlined in the official rules. The Scrutineer has the authority to approve or reject any vehicle or driver they deem unsafe or non-compliant. They will also conduct the mandatory Toolbox Talk, which all drivers and pit crew must attend. The Scrutineer's decisions are final, and no protests or appeals will be accepted.

To maintain fairness and accountability, the roles of Judge and Scrutineer must be performed by separate individuals

Marshal: An official positioned around the ring or entry/exit points to manage safety, enforce boundaries, assist with communication, and coordinate emergency response if required.

Safety Car: A designated emergency vehicle, such as a fire engine or response unit, positioned with visibility of the ring and ready to respond immediately to fire, rollover, or medical incidents. May also be referred to as the Control Car.

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5. Compliance and Agreement

- Entry Form, Waiver and Code of Conduct

1. Driver Safety Requirements

1.1 Full-faced helmet with visor or goggles must be worn.

1.2 Neck Brace must be worn – SFI Foam collar to be used.

1.3 One-piece driving suit or one-piece cotton drill overalls to be worn with covered footwear. No synthetic or nylon clothing allowed. No exposed skin allowed. All drivers must wear full-length, long-sleeved overalls. Leather gloves, boots or shoes must be worn. NO THONGS or SNEAKERS. NO NYLON CLOTHING.

1.4 Gloves of fire-retardant material to be worn.

2. Minimum Age

2.1 All drivers must be 17 years or over and hold a current driver's licence – P Plate minimum. Parent or legal guardian must complete and sign the waiver for all participants under 18 years.

3. Drugs and Alcohol

3.1 Drivers under the influence of alcohol or drugs will not be permitted to compete. Random drug and alcohol testing may be conducted before the event begins, and drivers must return a 0.0 or negative test result.

4. Vehicle Requirements

4.1 Vehicle Security and Safety

4.1.1 No obscene or offensive sign writing on cars. 4.1.2 The driver's name must be displayed on the right-hand side of the roof (150mm). 4.1.3 Strictly NO passengers will be permitted to travel in the vehicle.

4.1.4 Padding to be placed on all bar work and protrusions to protect the driver. 4.1.5 Centre of steering wheel to be padded, with airbags disconnected and removed. 4.1.6 Driver's side door to be painted white or red with the opposite colour painted in a cross on the door.

4.1.7 All doors and tailgate to be chained shut around door pillars using 6mm chain and bolted using 10mm bolts. Chain to go twice around door pillars and be bolted. Both front doors to be securely chained (6mm), bolted or welded shut. 4.1.8 If the vehicle has a tailgate, it must be chained closed with 6mm chain and bolted using 10mm bolts but must be accessible for scrutineering. 4.1.9 Battery to be securely mounted and covered with rubber matting. 4.1.10 Effective kill switch to be mounted in the centre cowl panel & marked in contrasting colours "KILL SWITCH." 4.1.11 All wires to be suitably grommited where they pass through the firewall. 4.1.12 Wires not to be attached to fuel lines.

4.1.13 All cars are to be cleaned out (no loose objects).

4.2 Vehicle Eligibility

4.2.1 All competing vehicles must be sedans, station wagons, panel vans, or utilities of average sedan size. 4.2.2 Full-chassis vehicles, defined as those where the chassis can be unbolted or separated from the body for the full length of the vehicle, are strictly prohibited. 4.2.3 Four-wheel drive vehicles are not permitted, and all-wheel drive vehicles must have their four-wheel drive system disconnected to operate as two-wheel drive. 4.2.4 Only original manufacturer body panels and equipment must be used in their entirety. 4.2.5 Special dispensation MUST be sought from the insurer for the inclusion of V8-powered vehicles.

4.3 Vehicle Modifications

4.3.1 Vehicle must use the original type manufacturer engine and transmission mounted in the original position. 4.3.2 The vehicle must be retained at its original height, i.e., no alteration to the suspension.

4.3.3 All holes in the firewall and front floor are to be covered. 4.3.4 Tow bars and bull bars to be removed. 4.3.5 All glass must be removed. 4.3.6 All interior linings, trims, interior/exterior door handles, glovebox lid, airbags, ornaments, chrome strips, and lights to be removed. 4.3.7 Dashboard (dashboard plastic) should remain in place as well as an interior rear-vision mirror. 4.3.8 Steel mesh must be welded on the driver's half windscreen.

4.3.9 A seat incorporating a headrest must be used. 4.3.10 All drivers are to wear a seat belt. Seat belts must be in good condition. The vehicle must not contain rust in either the seat or seat belt mountings.

4.3.11 Driver Safety Bars – **Mandatory**

No other internal or external bar work or reinforcement is allowed except for the two bars below, which are required:

- 1. A horizontal bar running from B pillar to B pillar (side to side) that supports the driver's seat.
- 2. A vertical bar running from the floor to the roof, positioned just behind the driver's seat and as close to the horizontal bar as possible. It must allow the driver's headrest to be properly fitted and secured.

Specifications for both bars:

- Minimum size: 50x50mm, 5mm thick RHS steel
- Ends must have 6mm thick steel plates
- Must be bolted in with at least 2 x 12mm (½ inch) bolts per end, using heavy-duty washers

Note: If using galvanised steel, it must be ground and prepped before welding.

4.3.12 Driver's Door Bracing – **Mandatory**

One of the following options must be used:

- a. Steel Plate:
 - Minimum 6mm thick steel plate
 - Must span at least the full width of the window if installed inside the door, or beyond the length of the door if installed externally
 - Must be welded or bolted on securely

OR

- b. RHS Bar Option:
 - Use two horizontal RHS steel bars, minimum size 40x40mm and 5mm thick
 - Bars must be 300–400mm apart
 - The bottom bar must sit roughly at hip height
 - Bars must be welded securely

4.3.13 The driver's door must be in good condition and approved by officials as safe.

4.3.14 The driver's door may be fully welded and/or chained closed.

4.3.15 Any sharp edges near the driver must be removed

4.3.16 Padding to be placed on all bar work and protrusions to protect driver.

4.4 Fuel and Fire Safety

4.4.1 An approved boat fuel tank or Jerry can with a breather must be fastened in the centre rear in a cradle, where the back seat was. 4.4.2 Fire extinguishers are allowed but must be securely mounted with a steel bracket. 4.4.4 The vehicle's petrol tank must be removed or punctured with a minimum 12mm hole. 4.4.5 A maximum of five (5) litres of petrol in the fuel tank is permitted.

4.4.4 The vehicle's petrol tank must be removed or punctured with a minimum 12mm hole. 4.4.5 A maximum of five (5) litres of petrol in the fuel tank is permitted.

4.5 Wheels and Tyres

4.5.1 Front wheel drive cars must only have standard car tyres. Where possible, standard car tyres should be used. At the show's discretion whether winter tread or rally type tyres are permitted. Strictly NO tractor tyres, racing rims or racing tyres permitted.

4.6 Surrender Flag

4.6.1 Each vehicle must have a white surrender flag (minimum size 30cm x 30cm) securely attached to a piece of dowel. The flag must be mounted above the driver's door in a location easily accessible to the driver. To indicate surrender or withdrawal from the event, the driver must snap the flag off. All vehicles must have their surrender flag flying before the derby commences.

This document, together with the Show Society Code of Conduct and the AgShows NSW Waiver Form, constitutes the official rules and guidelines governing Demolition Derby competitions held at NSW Agricultural Shows. Compliance with these requirements is mandatory for all participants. By signing the official entry form, each entrant (including competitors, exhibitors, and drivers) acknowledges and agrees to abide by all rules, regulations, terms and conditions of entry, and the Code of Conduct.

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
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SOME BASIC RULES & REGULATIONS

UTES & BIKE RACING

- A current, valid Driver's Licence – no Learners
- Zero alcohol or influence of drugs permitted for drivers. All participants must sign the ESS Waiver
- Utes must be registered and will be inspected prior to entry



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BARREL RACING RULES & REGULATIONS - VEHICLES

Drivers

1. A current, valid Driver's Licence is required and must be produced. Learners permit not accepted.
2. Drivers must exhibit a zero alcohol reading immediately prior to the event. Testing will be conducted by Officials.
3. Seat belts must be properly adjusted and worn during competition.
4. Drivers shall wear suitable footwear during competition. Thongs or sandals are not permitted.
5. No passengers are allowed. This is a driver only event unless assistance is required due to impairment such as hearing.
6. Any ute failing to keep within the defined competition area whilst competing will be automatically disqualified.
7. Any contact with barricades will result in disqualification.
8. Both driver and passenger doors to be kept 'unlocked' during competition.
9. Drivers will be asked to line up in competition order outside of the competition arena and await further instruction from Officials.
10. Officials will give each driver a quick debrief before they enter the arena, a horn will sound and the driver will start their run.
11. A horn will sound signalling the end of the run. The competitor is to stop immediately and leave the arena at 5kph (walking pace), prior to the next competitor entering the arena. Failure to do so will result in disqualification.

Competition Vehicles

12. Only vehicles which pass scrutiny will be allowed to compete.
13. Ute must be registered with registration papers in vehicle. Utes must be registered as a utility and must have a tub or tray (removable canopy allowed).
14. All utes will be checked for safety by Officials. Anything that may be dislodged during competition must be removed, (anything loose in/on tray, tool boxes must be removed).
15. Competition and demonstrations are restricted to one competing vehicle at a time.
16. Only competing vehicles are allowed in the competition area. The competing vehicle must have left the competition area prior to next the vehicle entering.

Competition / Pit Area

17. No alcohol is permitted in the Competition Pit Area during the conduct of this event.
18. The maximum speed of vehicles within the Competition Pit Area is 5kph (walking speed).
19. All Officials must stay behind safety barriers during competition.
20. Official Photographers must stay behind safety barriers during competition.
21. Qualified medical personnel must be on site and be in attendance.
22. NSW Rural Fire Service must be on site and in attendance with full knowledge of the competition.
23. Entry/Exit point into the Competition Area to be clearly marked.
24. Grounds will be wet down by the Officials before and between runs (as required) to eliminate dust.
25. Utes must stick to their defined barrel run and not touch the barrels during competition. If barrels are dislodged the driver will be disqualified.

Judging

26. The event will be judged on the quickest run free from infringements.
27. Judge's decisions are final.
28. The judges will also look for competitors respect to public safety.

CIRCLE WORK RULES

29. 4WD Utes - only stable 4WD Utes with a low centre of gravity and standard radial tyres can compete.
30. Officials will give each driver a quick debrief before they enter the arena, a horn will sound and the driver will start their circle work.

31. Competitors will be required to stop after TWO MINUTES*- a horn will sound signalling the end of the run. The competitor is to stop immediately and leave the arena at 5kph (walking pace), prior to the next competitor entering the area. Failure to do so will result in disqualification.

32. The circle work arena will be marked out using suitable materials.

33. Judges will award points as follows:

- Driving skills and level of control
- Drifting skills
- Number of completed circles
- Number of completed figure 8's
- Crowd reaction
- Full use of available area.

* Please note run times may vary depending on arena surface, weather conditions and entry number.

BARREL RACING RULES

34. Any Ute failing to keep within the defined competition area whilst competing will be automatically disqualified. Any contact with barricades will result in penalties as decided by Officials.

35. Officials will give each driver a quick debrief before they enter the arena, a horn will sound and the driver will start their run.

36. Utes must stick to their defined barrel run and do not touch the barrels during competition. If barrels are dislodged the driver will be given a time penalty.

37. The event will be judged on the quickest run including infringements.

General

38. The event must be held within the Arena of your showground and not any other established venue.

39. The demarcation between the cars/competitors and the spectators must be at least 20 metres.

40. Full and complete entries must be submitted prior to the commencement of the competition.

41. This application does not guarantee the offer of a position.

42. All successful competition entrants must be available to begin competitions at the time specified by the Show organisers.

43. Drivers are required to sign a waiver prior to competing.

44. The Show organisers reserve the right to vary the competition without notice.

45. Failure to comply with rules and parking instructions given by Officials will result in automatic disqualification from the competition and forfeiture of an entry fee.

A similar form must also be completed and signed by a parent or guardian for each competitor who is under 18 years of age. ALSO, on each Waiver, each horse with which the competitor is involved in competition at the Show must be listed together with the Property Identification Code (PIC) of the property from which the horse came to the Show.

- Stallions ineligible to compete in classes other than stallion classes.
 - Wrist bands will be issued and must be worn by all competitors.

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



GRAINS, SEEDS AND HAY

CLASS M

HANDY HINTS

Don't be deterred from exhibiting in a less than optimum season. This is taken into account by the Judge as all exhibits should have been exposed to the same adverse conditions. The Judge is looking for a quality product which will fulfil its market. For example, hay is designed for fodder so the most important points for the Judge are attractiveness and palatability to stock - smell should be sweet, fresh and untainted. It should be soft and obviously, look good enough to eat!

Your entry should be of an even size and quality.

Produce should not be tampered with, but 'as grown'. For example, don't remove leaves, heads, roots or pick out any foreign weeds or seeds in the sample. In classes for a sample of grain, it should be presented for judging as harvested. Judges expect a certain degree of contamination and imperfection in the seed, and as long as the sample is within board requirements it will not be penalised. A Judge knows what 'as harvested' looks like and may even frown upon a sample which looks picked over.

In sections for growing crop samples, height is not as important a consideration as some may think. The main criteria is always yield potential.

Pasture samples are judged on composition, density, pureness to type and yield as far as dry matter goes.

Freedom from disease is vital in Show classes.

Presentation is very important. Label samples neatly on a small piece of cardboard for example giving the crop name and variety. The spirit of showing is providing an exhibition for the public, many of whom may not know wheat from barley or triticale.

VEGETABLES, FARM PRODUCTS & FRUIT

CLASS N

HANDY HINTS

- If you grow fruit and vegetables, then why not show them?
- The main clue is the time of picking. Do not allow them to over mature in aiming for size.
- Density and richness of colour are the number one judging points, with size next, separating otherwise equal exhibits.
- Most vegetables are best picked on the day of judging to ensure that crisp, extra fresh look and touch. Even one day in the fridge can affect their freshness, although some such as lettuce are ok in the crisper. Some can be picked and stored for showing for example a good pumpkin.
- Collections (six unless stated otherwise) of the one fruit or vegetable should be even in size and shape choose your selection as close to the one size as possible. A small sample of the same size will score better than a lot of uneven produce.
- Heads such as cabbage and lettuce, must be dense and firm-hearted and cauliflower should be white and with no spread in the florets, which denotes over maturity.
- Root vegetables must be crisp and bright with no wood in the centre. Please wash and remove pests.
- Rhubarb should also be crisp with no sponginess or porosity in the stalks. (Also, a sign of over maturity or lack of freshness) when picked must be snapped not cut.
- When exhibiting citrus fruit don't be surprised by seeing a smaller exhibit win – the main judging points are after the fruit is cut- the juiciest and the skin depth (the thinner the better). Most over large fruit is thick-skinned and often dry. Display on a paper or plastic plate.
- Externally the fruit (citrus) should be smooth skinned and blemish free and again your sample should be even sized, perfectly round and bright coloured. The secret to citrus is often watering although some varieties and some trees are better producers than others. It would be wise to check your citrus by cutting a specimen before showing.
- Eggs are another popular section and depending on the judge, these are judged in a couple of ways.
- On looks they will be judged on shape and evenness of samples as well as size and colour.

Some judges weigh the samples with weight rather than size a telling point and some will crack an egg to check on yolk size and colour and freshness. Six clean eggs in carton. Tips down.

- Junior section is anyone under 18 years of age.

HANDY HINTS

CLASSES O & P

- Evenness of stitching and tension through the garment is the main judging criteria. Top knitters will not leave any sign of needle marks where they leave off. Choosing the right needle size for your wool ply is very important in getting the tension right.
- The inside of the garment must be as neatly finished as the outside. There should be NO loose threads, NO knots and the seams must be neatly finished in the same yarn as the garment and not bulky. The single worst fault with most knitting is that the inside finish is not neat enough.
- ALL garments should be worked in the one fibre - eg for a woollen jumper, seams and all finishing must be in woollen yarn, including buttons (don't sew on with cotton). In cotton crochet, all finishing should be in cotton.
- The more difficult patterns do not necessarily win more prizes. Tricky patterns can be easy to mess up and errors will glare at Judges. With a simple all-over stitch (eg stocking stitch) it can be more difficult to obtain a perfect look and this may be looked upon more favourably by Judges.
- Fine crochet must lie flat with no puckering or buckling - it must have an even tension throughout with no 'leggy' or loose stitches.
- Machine work must be straight and parallel and finished neatly. Seam finish is very important as are hems - all must be exactly straight and the seams must intersect in exactly the same spot.
- Use safety pins rather than ordinary sewing pins to attach tickets to your garment. This prevents pulling threads with loose pin ends.



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COOKING

CLASS Q

HANDY HINTS

Cooking has enough handy hints for showing, that a full book would be required. Just a sample is shown below. The main judging points observed are the overall appearance, the cut cake, the smell and the taste.

OVERALL APPEARANCE

- Above all the exhibit must look delicious - after all a vital aspect is edibility! To be a 'top' exhibit it should look perfect. This includes:
- The size of the mix must match the tin size, eg, a minimum of two inches thick (5 cm) for butter cakes.
- Wire rack marks on a cake do not enhance its appearance.
- Ensure the cake cooks flat on top by concaving the centre before cooking (ie, have the outside of the cake higher than the centre which rises more during cooking). The cake may taste delicious but could fail on appearance.
- Greasing, lining and flouring of the tin is crucial to the look of the cake which must be exhibited as it comes out of the tin, untrimmed.
- If iced (and do not ice unless it is specified in the schedule) then make it a neat even thickness, with no drips down the sides.
- Small cakes, biscuits and slices should be dainty - a common fault is making them too large, especially lamingtons (4 cm cubes is the ideal size) and slices (3 cm x 5 cm).

THE CUT CAKE

Judging includes how it cuts (preferably without the use of a bandsaw) and its appearance when cut. Points to consider:

- Texture - this should be fine, even and consistent throughout with no air bubbles. Cooking time is crucial to gain the best look when cut.
- Cakes with fruits and nuts won't cut easily if the pieces are too large - cut your dates, nuts, etc small and evenly.
- Fruit cakes won't look even throughout if the fruit sinks to the bottom during their long cooking time. Fruit must be totally dry when added to the mixture, even if it has been soaked. Dry and coat with flour (NB - use flour from the recipe, not any extra).
- Colour intensity must be matched in marble and rainbow cakes. If the chocolate is dark, the pink should be dark - if you use a pale delicate pink, then the chocolate should also be light.

Please follow this compulsory recipe.

INGREDIENTS:

250g sultanas
250 g chopped raisins
250 g currants
125 g chopped mixed peel
90 g chopped red glace cherries
90 g chopped blanched almonds
1/3 cup sherry or brandy
250 g plain flour
60 g self-raising flour
1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
250g butter
250g soft brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
1/2 teaspoon almond essence
1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
4 large eggs.

RECOMMENDED METHOD:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight. Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after, each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon. Place the mixture into a prepared square 20cm x 20cm (8" x 8") tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 1/2 - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4-6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

Judge Note:

The height of the cake should not exceed 5.7cm (57mm)

PRESERVES

CLASS R

HANDY HINTS

- Read the schedule carefully and note the requested size of jars.
- Take more care with keeping lids clean. They must be plain, without handwriting OR commercial printing, eg, paint the tops or use contact.
- Examine tops of exhibits for signs of mould.
- Jars should be filled to just above the neck to the lid-line so there is no gap showing between the lid and the contents, **BUT DO NOT OVER-FILL THE JARS.**
- All jars or bottles should have a **label on it with a list of ingredients used.**
- Jars and bottles should have the date it was made on it and also marked if it is hot and/or spicy.
- No old jams, jellies, chutneys etc are to be entered for judging.
- Flavour can vary markedly between batches of stone fruit and varieties and the fruit quality controls the jam quality. **FLAVOUR** is the most important element of all jams and preserves. Always taste test your own before exhibiting.
- **If you wouldn't eat it, then why exhibit it?**

DEFINITIONS

Preserves

May be sweet (like a jam and marmalade) or savoury (chutneys, relish or pickles). Antibacterial spices such as mustard, garlic and cinnamon are often used in savoury preserves.

Butters, Cheese and Curds

For a fruit butter cheese and curds, the fruit is usually cooked with egg yolks, sugar and sometimes butter to produce a flavoured, smooth spread.

Chutney

Is made with fruit and / or vegetable cooked with vinegar, sugar and usually spices. Chutneys may be either sweet or hot. A good chutney, whatever the ingredients, should be reasonably smooth and have a mellow flavour. The basic ingredients, such as apples and onions are minced or chopped finely. Chutneys are best left for at least a month to mellow and mature.

Conserves

Are similar to jams, except that large pieces or whole fruits are used and cooked in such a way that the fruit maintains its shape. The fruit may be layered with sugar and left to stand before cooking, which toughens it so that it will not break down during boiling. The syrup that surrounds the fruit should be clear and bright in colour.

Jams

Are usually made from fresh fruit (excluding citrus), though fruit pulp preserved in season can be also used. The fruit is chopped or crushed with sugar until set and is fairly smooth.

Jelly

Is made by cooking fruit with water and sugar and then passing it through a fine cloth strainer to remove all traces of the fruit, resulting in a clear spread.

Marmalades

Are made from citrus fruits and can be based on a single variety or a combination of two or three fruits. The most popular being oranges, lemons, limes, grapefruit and cumquats. Marmalades may also contain other ingredients such as vegetables or spirits such as whiskey.

Relish

Like a chutney, a relish consists of chopped vegetables and/or fruit is usually used as a condiment and can be sweet, tangy or spiced. It often has a chunkier or crispier texture than chutney.

FLOWERS

CLASS S

HANDY HINTS

- Pick most Show entries on judging morning - very early (or late on the evening before) and put straight into water up to their necks—then take inside for sorting into individual jars. It is a good idea to select one entry at a time from your list - this is much better than picking everything, taking it inside and then trying to choose what will go in each section.
- There are some exceptions to this rule - pansies are better if picked when totally dry - early in the morning the dew can stain the petals.
- Iceland poppies can be picked early as long as they aren't too advanced. In warm weather they are best picked as buds and they will be open for showing one to two days on.
- Carnations open up more attractively if picked early, a day or two, and allowed to open indoors.
- Some cuts may be better if 'conditioned'. For example, one very successful exhibitor scalds the stems of poppies and dahlias by pouring boiling water on them for 60 seconds to prevent them dropping.
- Don't add anything to the water - as long as the flowers have a good drink when they are picked most will last without additives.
- The stage of bloom at cutting time is critical. The flowers should be fully out at judging, but JUST! Judges look for different things with flowers and it is not always size. Symmetry is very important - an even shape, the same on both sides, and blemish-free blooms.
- Geraniums are judged on the shape of the head, which should be a true round shape, dense with flowers and showing some foliage.
- In a section such as that for a cut of flowering shrub, it is the length of the flowering head that is important, relative to others of the same variety.
- For individual flowers such as gerbera, size is an important consideration.
- NND - Stand for Not Necessarily Distinct.

HANDY HINTS

- Some successful exhibitors in decorative class suggest that you read the schedule three or four times and then put it aside for a while and 'sleep on it' - the inspiration will come!
- Decorative class sections are in titles - they are an art form - and the title suggests a style - the finished article is a whole picture, a blend of shape, size, colour of container and contents.
- The first element is the container and it must suit the style. 'Bold and Beautiful' for example would not suggest a shapely, slender container.
- The next important element is the line material, on non-plant material that provides the background, the emphasis being on 'line'.
- A 'no-no' is for any needle aid to be visible. Arrange foliage to hide it.

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

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


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
